What is a NSMP

A collaborative process that allows staff, residents and stakeholders to participate in managing speeds in their neighborhoods.



How does an NSMP typically work?

Step 1:

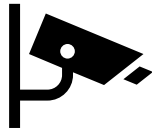
Residents proactively work with their neighbors to submit a request to the NSMP



How does an NSMP typically work?

Step 2:

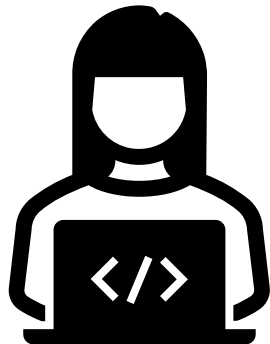
Field data collection to determine if the street, intersection or corridor is eligible for the NSMP



How does an NSMP typically work?

Step 3:

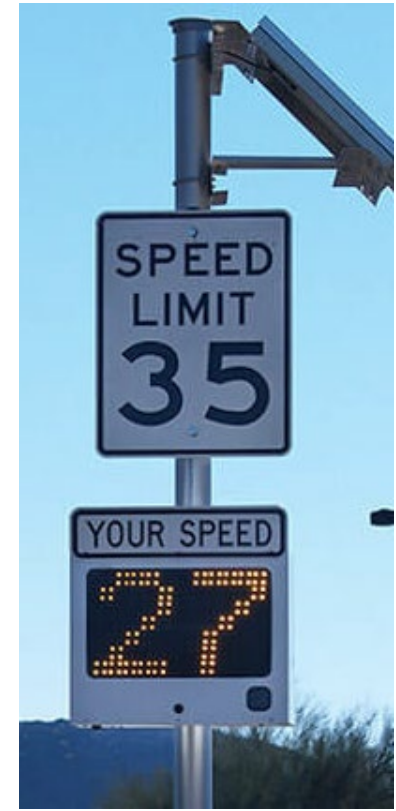
Town staff or an appointed board review data and determine eligibility



How does an NSMP typically work?

Step 4:

Neighborhood meetings hosted by Town staff will determine which design, education and enforcement “**toolbox**” can be applied

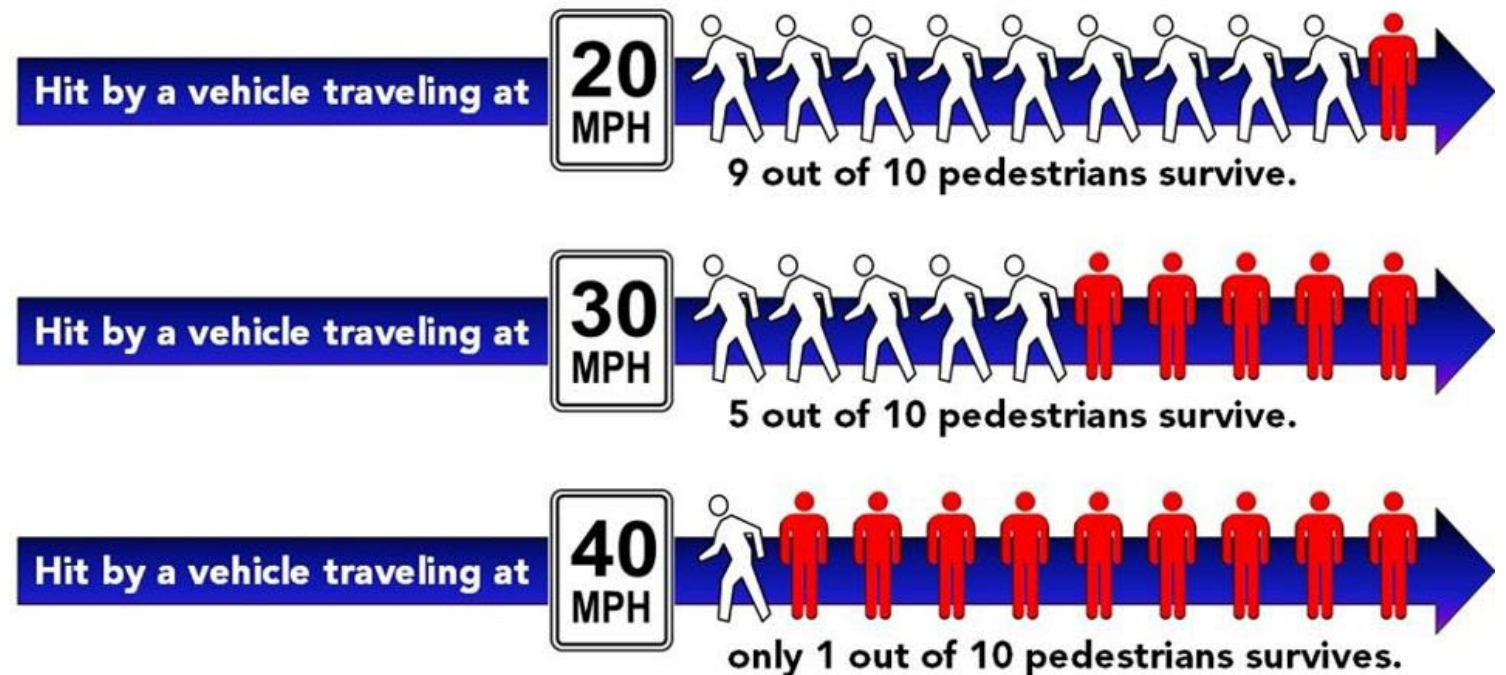

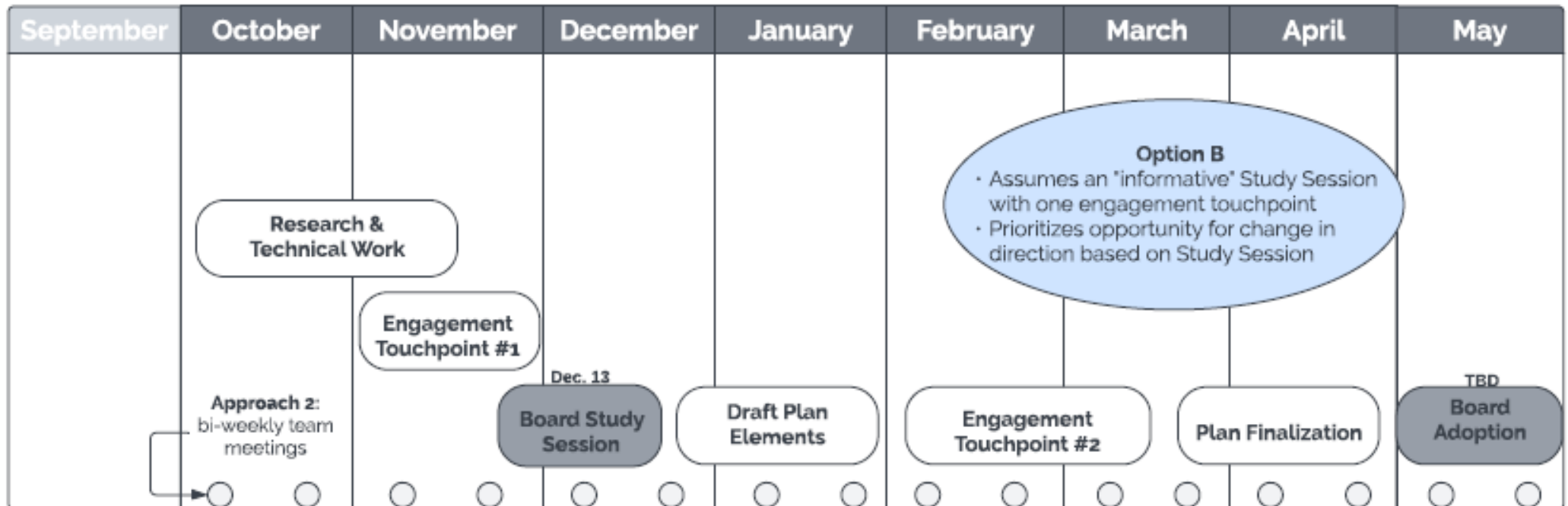
Why an NSMP in Erie now?

- Increased resident requests for speed management
- Need a systematic and fiscally organized plan for current and future neighborhoods
- “Vision Zero” funding available for projects

- Integrating toolbox into development review
